Unfortunately he cannot live with children, cats or other dogs but would be fine for a couple or single person who could provide a warm fireside and a patch of grass for him to have a potter as and when he is able. All veterinary costs would be met by the Trust. <u>Carol</u> cat is also still here after 12 months in the sanctuary. She is also beginning to deteriorate due to arthritis and we are appealing for someone special to give her some comfort in her dotage. As with any other fosters the vets costs would be met by the Trust, you would just need to supply food and TLC.

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## **INTRODUCING....**



**Primrose** is a lovely little x Lionhead bunny. She came to us from a flat at the age of 10 weeks, at the end of October. She has had her vaccination but will need to be spayed in the new year and any new owner



will need to commit to getting this done. She is a little skittish but has improved a lot while she has been with us and, with regular handling, will become a lovely bunny who could live with a neutered male of a similar size.

<u>Hancock</u> is a lovely gentle neutered buck aged 14 months whose elderly owner had to move to sheltered accommodation and couldn't take his rabbits. He is used to being handled and previously lived as a house rabbit so it would be lovely if he could go to live indoors and once again be a pampered bunny. He may be able to live with a gentle spayed doe but he has been bullied in the past so would need a careful introduction.

Buster and Bedbug are two brothers aged 10 months who have come to us from a loving but



overstretched home. They were living with both parents—a German Shepherd mother and Collie father—as well as several more of their siblings as their owner had not managed to find homes when they were little. When they arrived they had never been out on a lead or where they would meet other people, sights and sounds, so everything here was new and very scary for them. They have lovely personalities and are learning to walk on the lead without panicking. They will ideally each need a separate home but with another steady older companion dog to show them the way and an experienced patient

owner to put in the time and work to house train and socialise them. As x collie/GSD's they will need lots of exercise and stimulation, too, so please bear this in mind if you are considering rehoming one of them. **Lucy** is a lovely gentle older lady who would love to be with someone she can attach to. She is very sweet and gets on with all people and animals but suffers badly from separation anxiety. Her previous owner had to move to a non dog friendly care home and unfortunately the first home where we placed her didn't work out due to the way she panicked if she had to be left alone—even for very short periods of time. We think she needs a home where she can be with someone 24/7—she would be safe to live with someone disabled and would even love to be somewhere like a nursing or care home environment as there would always be someone there.





We received these lovely photo's from Sue who rehomed <u>Scruff</u> and <u>Lucky</u> recently. She says "<u>Scruff</u> ticked every box for me! Male older dog and a cuddle boy. What more could I have asked for? It did not take him long to become a big part of our family.


