We'll begin with news of our latest building project—a new Kittery:

KITTERY PROJECT

The Kittery at Windyway was first adapted from two loose boxes around 20 years ago and in that time has housed hundreds of mum cats and kittens. It has been having repairs over the past few years and recently Wendy, the family and staff have decided it is time to replace it with a new building. The new Kittery will be purpose built in UPVC which should be longer lasting and easier to keep clean—bearing in mind how many cats bring various parasites and bugs with them when they first arrive at the sanctuary. We are very excited about the new building which will be arriving in November. Meanwhile we have been busy demolishing and clearing the site. The next job will be to prepare a new base. We plan to have tiled floors with under floor heating as well as separate bedrooms which can be used by older kittens or in the winter when adult cats are using the accommodation. There is going to be a separate appeal for funds to assist Windyway with the initial outlay so watch the website and facebook pages for details of how to donate.

FUNDRAISING AND EVENTS

For the first time ever on 14th December, we held Carols at Windyway, which was well attended, despite the weather, and led by Adam Partridge, and the Carols were accompanied by Hilary Cobb on violin and Pam Dooley on accordion. There was also a tree of remembrance for our beloved pets who are no longer with us.



So far in 2105 we are having a really good fundraising year. The Spring Fair was a huge success, making a brilliant total of £1800.00. In April we held fundraisers for two days at Pets at Home as part of their Spring Raffle event and received a cheque from them for £561.00. In May a Quiz Night was held for us at the Royal British Legion, Poynton, organised by Brian Williams, Linda Pratt and Simon Inkpen, together with the help of some ladies who did a raffle. This raised the brilliant sum of £472.14. We took part in the Langley Fete in June and raised £104.00 and the weather improved as the day went on and the sun shone for us in the afternoon. The Canine Club on Sandy Lane invited us to have a stall at their Open Day on the 5th July. They held a raffle and a Dog Show and generously donated all the proceeds from them to us and also the donations for refreshments. They handed us £268.40 and together with the £94 we made on our stall, a grand total of £362.40 was raised. The same day we also attended Wilmslow Show. We had not been to this show before and were amazed at the enormity of it. We made £43.00, but now we know the extent of the show, we shall have a bigger stall next year, as we have already received an invitation for 2016. On the 18th July we had a stall at Jollyes, Congleton's Pet Store Birthday Bash, where we raised £143.57, plus £15.90, which Jollyes made on face painting on the day, which they donated to us. Thankfully the weather stayed fine, but it was quite windy in the morning, and at one stage, we took the lid off the tickets for the Children's Tombola when a gust of wind came and blew the tickets out of the box. We had our exercise for the day when we had to go running round the pavements catching the tickets – thankfully, with the help of some kind people, we managed to retrieve them all. The Trust is 10 years old this year, and to celebrate this we held a Garden Party at Windyway on Saturday 25th July. The Party was opened by Adam Partridge, our Patron, and he was
