INTRODUCING.....

Pippin (thanks to Sian Budgen, one of our volunteers, for the words and photo). My previous owners lived on an estate in Macclesfield, but they left me behind when they moved away. A lovely lady named Susanne managed to catch me and asked Windyway if they would be able to look after me. At first they had no space, so I was temporarily put in the care of the attentive staff at Bollington Vets, who kept me safe until a pen became available. I am a very affectionate boy; I love having a fuss and getting cuddles - especially when there are treats involved! I am also very playful and I can often be found chasing string or chewing on toy mice.



Sadly, I have been tested positive for Feline Immunodeficiency Virus (FIV); it infects and attacks the white blood cells in my immune system, meaning that I am more likely to catch the infections and diseases that other cats may fight off easily. The disease affects between two and five per cent of the UK cat population and it is often passed on through biting during fights. This does mean that I will need to be kept indoors in my new home and away from other cats, however I can still live a long and happy life just as any cat would. As an indoor cat, I may need cheering up from time to time, so having access to scratching posts and lots of toys will help to keep me entertained. I love to sit on windowsills too, so keeping a bird feeder outside will provide me with plenty of distractions.

I have been at Windyway for a couple of months now, and though I love the staff and everything they have done for me, I am ready to find a new and loving furever home! The Blue Cross charity has provided a helpful and detailed page on FIV here: https://www.bluecross.org.uk/pet-advice/fiv-cats

We have 3 more FIV positive cats in our care at Windyway, all of whom will need indoor homes. It may be possible to bond a couple of them to rehome together so that they would have company but we haven't tried this with them so far. They are



Sylvie arrived at Windyway with her sister Stella (not pictured) back in March. They are almost 6 years old. Sylvie is FIV positive, Stella is negative which goes to show how difficult it is to pass on as they have lived together their whole lives. They are very timid



so would need a quiet and patient household. <u>Grover</u> came to us as a stray from Macclesfield town centre—he had been living as a feral for a couple of years but is quite a friendly boy now. <u>Ella</u> arrived in October when her owner was taken into hospital. She is 11 years old and in addition to being FIV positive she has mild kidney disease so is on a special diet. She does not require medication at this stage. She is a super friendly girl.

Below is a testimony from Jenny who fostered Felix who was FIV positive until he passed away recently at the age of 19 (ish)

"Said our goodbyes to Felix a couple of days ago, hard decision to make and broke my heart. Got him from Windyway a few years ago at the grand old age of 17; wasn't sure if he would settle, going from being in the cattery to the a crazy household full of kids and a mad lab, but it didn't take him long. Still keep hearing his little jingle bell, miss him under my feet and the house is a lot quieter now we are down one very vocal cat. So happy he got to spend his last few years in a loving family home making the most of being the top dog, tormenting the dog with games of hide, seek and pounce, endless demanding cuddles from the kids, being carried around like a king, and food on demand.

Smokey and Bodhi are brothers, born in 2014 and they are beautiful affectionate boys who were originally rehomed from Windyway as kittens but returned to us when their owner's circumstances changed. Bodhi is very fit and Smokey looks the picture of health but, unfortunately, this is an illusion. Smokey has been diagnosed with advanced heart disease for which there is no treatment or cure. We would love him to spend his final months in a loving home where he can be pampered and fit a whole lifetime into the short time he may have. Both boys love to play outside in the day-time; Bodhi in particular loves climbing and is often found on top of the pen door if it is open! They both love plenty of cuddles and must stay together.

You may have noticed that nearly all the cats featured have some kind of health condition. The trustees have kindly agreed to assist with vet fees which are related to their existing conditions so please don't let financial constraints prevent you from adopting any of these beautiful cats.

And here are a couple from longer ago—animals whose poor start in life took a turn for the better once adopted by kind, understanding people and our thanks go to them for sending their stories and for giving Jemima and Molly the lives they deserved.

"18 years ago I adopted a very frightened very abused kitten from Windyway. My daughter who was only 3 at the time was a fan of Beatrix Potter, however she got the duck and the cat confused. So the lovely kitten got named Jemima Puddlecat! Causing much amusement at the vets. It took her a long time to trust anyone but eventually she would accept myself, my daughter and my neighbour if

anyone else came to the house she would hide and people would ask if I actually had a cat or just kept bowls out for decoration. She loved to go out in the garden but rarely left the safety of it, she would run from birds or anything that moved. Inside the house she would play with toys, steal food cooling on the side and at night snuggle next to me. She was a very loving cat to those she trusted.

Sadly at the age of 18 Jemima Puddlecat developed heart failure and died peacefully in my arms she now sleeps forever in my garden close to the bench and the pond that she loved. After sitting on the floor for about 30 minutes she showed her face. Her name was Molly, so nervous yet so nosy. We decided to take her for a walk with our other dog and they seemed to get on. We said that we would take her home for a couple of weekends to see how it goes. Molly seemed to settle in but was still very nervous.

I will keep this as short as I can.

We adopted Molly. Over the next 10 years she became our world. She has been round Europe twice, travelled the UK from Inverness to Lands End many times. She has been the "Golden Oldie" in "Your dog" magazine, the front cover of the Cheshire dogs home calendar, always being mentioned on Radio 2 (Jonte & Molly).



She had her 18th birthday on the 8th August. Here is the sad bit. 2 days later we had to make the decision to let Molly go to sleep, her back legs had given up on her and she was so, so tired. She passed over the Rainbow Bridge on the 9th August. We would not have had the best dog in the world if it had not had been for Windy Way trust. Thank you so much for all the work you do. Molly sends her love from heaven."

FUNDRAISING AND EVENTS

As well as everyone having fun, we raised a brilliant total of £2,626.98. A well deserved thank you to **Danesford Dog Club** who raised the sum of £170.00 for us by having a stall, games and an agility course.



Our **Christmas Fair** took place on the 12th November at The Senior Citizens Hall. People were queueing up waiting for us to open. We are always amazed at the fantastic donations people give us. The stalls were laden with all sorts of goods, a cake stall with the most delicious cakes (we have some really brilliant bakers out there) and everyone took time out to have a cup of tea and refreshments served by the ladies in the kitchen. When the money had been counted we were over the moon to find out that we had made £2555.21.
